Incarnate Light

"I give you as a light to the nations, that my salvation may reach to the ends of the earth." Isaiah 49:6

We struggle to grasp the scope and meaning of the Incarnation. That the Son of God, the Messiah, the Savior of the world, was born of a virgin in Bethlehem, in a humble manger, is beyond our comprehension. The supernatural testimony of angels and the human testimony of shepherds, moving star and the Magi, and the miraculous protection through the flight to Egypt speak to us of mystery, wonder, and power. The prophesy in the Servant Song of Isaiah 49 outlines a global significance not just for a

backwater Rome outpost, but for the whole history of the world.

John the Baptist gave testimony of the Spirit descending upon Jesus as a dove, and that Jesus would baptize with the Holy Spirit. A new spiritual dimension is introduced by Jesus: life-changing spiritual immersion, a deeper cleansing from the power of sin, a personal relationship with the Almighty, and a depth of love that previously had been imagined. What does mortal man, limited in mind, spirit, and emotions, do with such concepts?

We receive Jesus, the gift of light incarnate, and let him illumine the world through us. As his living Body now, we participate in that Incarnation event. We are to be "a light to the nations". The source is not us, it is Jesus. He empowers us to fulfill this purpose by the Holy Spirit (1 Corinthians 1:6-7). We have a high and holy calling, as we who have been gifted with Incarnate Light, are given as a light to the nations.

This Christmas let us receive anew the gift of the life giving Incarnate Light and pray in thanksgiving:

We praise you Jesus, blessed Incarnate Light, fill the hearts of your faithful people and kindle in us the fire of your love, that we may be your light bearers to the nations. Amen

Stewardship - "Stewardship Fire"

Fire! The word naturally prompts a response. Fire suggests things like high energy, great power, and the need for action. Perhaps you're thinking this understanding doesn't sound much like the usual reaction to the word "Stewardship." In fact many congregations hold off even using the term stewardship because the first and only thing hearers think of is treasure or \$money\$. So how do we get fired up about Stewardship? Better yet, how does God fire us up about stewardship? We have an ongoing set of Synod-wide programs that use fire, the symbol of God's Holy Spirit, as a means of returning us to our mission of making disciples for Jesus Christ.

Stewardship Southern Style focuses on Making Disciples for Jesus. Walking together with Synod, we have defined stewardship in this manner: "Christian stewardship is the free and joyous activity of the child of God and God's family, the church, in managing all of life and life's resources for God's purposes." We in the Southern District like to emphasize that the Love for Christ, generated by the Gospel, is the motivating factor for true Christian giving. For this reason we add the statement . . . "In response to the Gospel, stewardship is part of discipleship." To have a fire three things are essential: fuel, heat, and air. This trinity of elements provides some interesting parallels with the Holy Trinity. The fuel is like the Gospel of Jesus, the Word. The heat is like the Holy Spirit. And the air is like the life giving breath of God.

We request your prayerful consideration and generous response to the 2014 Partnership Commitment. May we by Jesus' love and the Holy Spirit's power respond by managing all of God's gifts to the glory of Jesus (Waldo Werning).

..... *LINCNewOrleans* - **Project Reach NOLA**

St. Paul Lutheran, a mostly white, rather "resource-gifted" congregation in the gentrified "Marigny" neighborhood of New Orleans doesn't seem to have much in common with Journey 9th Ward; an under-resourced, mostly black, Assemblies of God congregation in the "St. Claude" neighborhood, or so they thought. They found out through a strong partnership with LINCNewOrleans, an organization committed to networking churches and neighborhood leaders who strive to transform their surrounding communities.

Leaders at J9 approached LINCNewOrleans leaders last spring for help to put on a summer leadership and service initiative for at-risk teens. J9 had some great ideas, but lacked some of the resources and capacity to pull off the vision, and St. Paul was looking for a way to connect outside their regular circles, so a partnership was born!

LINCNewOrleans brought leaders from St. Paul and J9 together to put together an ambitious plan that included 5 weeks of leadership development around a process called "Leading Inside Out" combined with service opportunities in the St. Claude neighborhood painting and landscaping two of the many houses still blighted since Hurricane Katrina.

The City of New Orleans was offering contracts to outside entities to offer summer work and leadership

training for the youth of New Orleans. The program asked organizations to plan for about 30 youth between 16 and 21 years old. An application was put together, sent to the city, and they liked our plan so much that they wanted us to consider 90 youth, rather than the 30 expected!

After the scramble to find enough volunteers and concerns about working with so many youth, it worked beyond anyone's expectations. During 5 weeks in July and August "Project Reach NOLA" served almost 90 youth, with incredible results. Over two dozen volunteers from both congregations led students in an incredibly introspective process of self-discovery. By the end, through small and large group discussion, artistic expression, and writing, every youth was able to articulate a "Personal Legacy Statement". In addition, they were able to see 2 houses repainted and landscaped by their own hands!

When it was over, the folks from J9 and St. Paul were exhausted, but were in awe of what they were able to accomplish. Neither congregation could've done it on their own, but by crossing racial, economic, and denominational boundaries, together, by faith, they moved mountains! There's already talk about "what's next for us to do? Together!"

Lutheran Women's Missionary League (LWML) Activities

First – Birmingham, AL

2013 was a most eventful year for First – Birmingham's LWML's mission projects. Through sales of it's "Taste of First" 125th Anniversary cookbook, donations received on LWML Sunday, and matching funds from Thrivent, the group was quite successful in meeting mission objectives.

On the local level we were able to assist the Bread of Life Food Pantry and Clothes Closet in feeding and clothing kids and their families.

On an international level the LWML supported Lutheran World Relief's malaria initiative. The Lutheran Malaria Initiative (LMI) works through local

partners to educate families on malaria, increase access to treatment, and provide prevention tools such as bed nets.

Earlier this year, the LWML initiated a "Giving Thanks with Grateful Hearts" congregational mission project where congregation members gave up items (toiletries, etc) for approximately 40 days. The items were placed in pillowcases and donated to homeless women and children at Jessie's Place.

First LWML purchased curriculum materials for M-POWER ("Mission to Provide Opportunities With

Empowering Results."). M-POWER provides one-to-one literacy instruction to adults who want to learn to read or improve their reading skills.

We worked with the ENRICH (Enhancing Needed Resources, Increasing Children's Horizons) Summer Camps of Lutheran Ministries of Alabama (LMA) by purchasing supplies for four camps this summer.

First LWML looks forward to an even more rewarding year in 2014.
