Our Confidence is in the Lord

Those who trust in the Lord are like Mount Zion, which cannot be moved, but abides forever. (Psalm 125:1, RSV)

October brings to mind the Reformation, Dr. Martin Luther, and his courageous stand in the face of death for the truth of his faith. Many have wondered how one man could take such an immovable position in light of great opposition. Surely, knowing the answer could have an impact on our individual and corporate life.

It is in this light we focus on the amazing words of the Psalmist. He says that those who put their confidence in the Lord, who truly believe in him and live in this assurance, are like Mount Zion. It doesn't say they should be or will be like Mount Zion, but they are like Mount Zion. In God's sight it is already true.

They are said to be like Mount Zion in two specific ways: 1) they cannot be moved, and 2) they abide forever. A mountain is the epitome of an object that cannot be moved. When Jesus wanted to illustrate something that was humanly impossible, he spoke of moving mountains. Mount Zion was particularly immovable because it was surrounded by other mountains.

Trust in the Lord and his never ending grace similarly makes a Christian secure, solid, and steady so that nothing can shake him or her. We need not be threatened by the difficult circumstances of life, the sudden changes brought on by tragedy or even natural disaster. Our confidence in God can be that strong. This is especially so if we are part of a group of Christians who trust in the Lord together.

Furthermore, the cross of Jesus Christ proclaims that we

will abide forever with the Lord. Our security is not in this life only, but even more in the life that is to come, when our trust will turn to sight and we shall live in his presence forever.

Any mountain would have been sufficient to give this sense of security but this is Mount Zion. This is "his holy mountain, beautiful in elevation, the joy of all the earth" (Psalm 48:2). This is Mount Zion, "the city of the great King." It is his dwelling place. We are secure because "the great King" lives in and among us. Through our trust in a the Lord we can be individually and corporately lifted up to be the joy of the whole earth.

Again in Revelation, just when Satan appears to have taken over the whole earth, the spotlight of heaven suddenly swings around and there on Mount Zion stands the victorious Lamb surrounded by the armies of heaven (Revelation 14:1). Mount Zion is where God reveals his overcoming power. It is where Jesus stands ready to accomplish the ultimate victory. If we are "like Mount Zion" then we are the place where Jesus' victory is secure and where he stands, awaiting the time of his unveiling to the world. This is truly an amazing statement.

Now and again we need to be reminded of who God is, what he has done for us, is doing for us, and will do for us, and how confident we can be in him. No wonder Peter writes, "the God of all grace, who has called you to his eternal glory in Christ, will himself establish, strengthen, and settle you" (1 Peter 5:10).

Prayer: Thank you, Father, that in Jesus you will never fail us nor forsake us. Amen

I love to see the church behave like the church or to put it another way..... Jesus said, "I have come that they may have life and have it to the full." That full life doesn't begin when we by grace through faith in Jesus enter heaven. It begins the moment we belong to the one who died on a cross to make us His. The full life becomes clearer to us as we try to look at the world the way Jesus looks at the world. Spend some time in the Gospels. You will see Jesus over and over again looking around seeing what good He can do and then by the Spirit's power doing it and making a difference. Spend some time watching and learning from Jesus and then you will be able to live a fuller life. Jesus promised so you can take it to the bank.


Trinity – Gadsden, AL

St. Paul - Birmingham





Deadlines: The Spirit of Southern is produced six times a year. Deadlines are the 15th of odd numbered months (Jan., Mar., May, July, Sept., Nov.) Please keep in mind that from deadline to your mailbox is a time frame of approximately one month. If you wish to announce a coming event, it should be sent well ahead of the event date. Material received after the deadline will be included in the web edition.

What to send: We look for the "good news" of events happening in your congregation – special programs, outreach events, installations, dedications, anniversaries, new member Sundays, etc. A good photo is a plus! Please see photo information below. The guideline for article length is 200 words.

What cannot be used: Our non-profit postal permit does not allow for any advertisement. Therefore, we cannot include information that may result in sales of a product or service. Also, space does not permit the publication of creative writing.

How to submit: The preferred method is e-mail to the editor at sosstuff@yahoo.com. Articles and photos may also be mailed to the District Office (The Spirit of Southern – Southern District LCMS – 100 Mission Drive, Slidell, LA 70460-5221). Please allow 2 weeks for mailing.

Photos: Please keep in mind that we cannot improve the quality of your photo. A dark background or grainy print will look darker or grainier in the publication. If you are using a digital camera, please set to the highest resolution. This is necessary for a quality photo to be produced on a press. If you are sending a print, use a high quality photo paper or photo lab printing. Scanned pictures, Polaroids and photocopies cannot be used, and prints are not returned.

Where: Outdoor photos will generally result in a better photo for publication. Be sure that indoor pictures are taken in a brightly lit location with a light background, if possible.

What: A good question to ask is, "What would I like people to see from this event?" Include people whenever possible. If individuals can be identified, please include that information with the photo.

Installation photos: The traditional photo of pastors in attendance at the installation is a wonderful memento for the pastor to keep, but we prefer for publication that you include the pastor and members of his new congregation (officers, call committee, elders, etc.) as they begin ministry together. Another option is the pastor and his family as they are welcomed into a new congregational family.

We look forward to receiving and sharing your congregation's good news!
