## Bold Faith – Bold Living

*“For God did not give us a spirit of timidity, but a spirit of power, of love and of self-discipline. 2 Timothy 1: 7*

This month the church celebrates Reformation. At the forefront of this event was a man by the name of Dr. Martin Luther. Many have wondered what was at the center of this earth changing event, and what changed the fearful monk, Luther, into a fearless witness of the Gospel. The answer is the powerful Spirit of God. When the pure Gospel of God's free grace in Jesus Christ touched the hearts of his people, they fully understood what Timothy was writing about in his second letter. God has not given us a spirit of timidity, or fear as an older version translates it.

There is need for this same reformation even today. Fear is not of God, yet we operate so much out of fear and timidity. We determine our actions often on the basis of fear. We are fearful of what people will say or think about what we do. We are afraid to trust God and follow the leading of the Holy Spirit. We are afraid to risk ourselves for the kingdom. We are afraid to commit ourselves to doing the will of God



because of the cost or the consequences. So we live out our days timidly and seldom see the hand of God at work in our day to day existence.

We need to live each day trusting God. He loves us in Jesus. He declares us his children though the waters of baptism. He wants to give us good things, to provide for us and protect us. Why are we afraid of him? He gives us the spirit of power - not our power, which is puny, but his power to meet the situations which overwhelm us and are so much greater than our power. He gives us the spirit of love - his love to dwell in and to share with others. We can't love anyone beyond ourselves without the gift of his love. He gives

us the gift of self-discipline. Many of us have a hard time disciplining ourselves in places of recurring temptation. We have a difficult time controlling lifelong habits and patterns of behavior. We find it often exhausting to rein in our impulses and feelings. Yes, he has given us the spirit of self-control to help us follow his will and way.

Don't let the enemy (or the "old evil foe" as Luther calls him) fool you into believing that God has not provided all that you need in your situation. Don't surrender to fear today. Don't let it rule your life. Choose to believe this great promise. Live in the spiritual gifts that God has provided for you. Then you will live in the joy of reformation. *Lord, thank you for gracing us with your gifts of power, and love, and self-discipline. Help us to use these gifts today to do your will that reformation may continue in your church, your world and in us today. Amen.*

## Revitalization & Transformation - Seasons of Discovery

Southern District congregations can benefit through participation in a new process offered through Transformation Churches Network (TCN). Seasons of Discovery is a step-wise Church Transformation process delivered to the congregation in four seasons over two or more years, that helps your church begin engagement in your community with the Gospel of Jesus.

Why a new process? Many congregations struggle to reach and to serve the community. For many years, congregations have depended on events to reach the community by bringing the people to the building. We live in a new culture and age where persons want to see faith in action in the community.

Genesis 1:14-15 notes: "And God said, "Let there be lights in the expanse of the heavens to separate the day from the night. And let them be for signs and for seasons, and for days and years, and let them be lights in the expanse of the heavens to give light upon the earth." And it was so." In creation, God used light for signs and seasons. So also today, Jesus as the Light of the world is calling the Church to be His light in new ways to reach those not connected by faith to Jesus.

Our fiscal year ending June 31, 2014 realized profits of over \$1,200,000.00 and a record number of loans were also processed. At the current loan rate of 4% (3% for designated missions) many congregation are re-financing their secular loans, upgrading their property as well as planning new construction.

more than competitive in our products plus you have the satisfaction of knowing your interest is growing in your church.



## Camp Restore Nine Years Later - Where We Stand

The following is a brief summary of where Camp Restore is today; over the next 12 months we'll be taking a deeper look at the past decade of RAI Ministries' work on the Gulf Coast and into the future with a monthly blog series under The Latest at [camprestore.org](http://camprestore.org).



We've come a long way in the past nine years. Much of what was flooded has been restored. Today a nationwide network of volunteers has joined with local volunteers and nonprofits, working together to restore homes, relationships with one another, and our environment.

Katrina highlighted problems that affect not only New Orleans, but many cities. There are significant systemic and social-justice issues that are just beginning to be addressed. Katrina also created opportunity to respond to these challenges in new ways, transforming NOLA into a test bed of community innovation with the highest rate of charter school students in the nation and a business start-up rate that far outpaces the rest of the country.

In many ways, New Orleans' story is also the story of 21st-century America. We have a lot of work to do, but we also have many new opportunities to use our God-given personal gifts and resources to do it. From a Christian perspective, it's a lot like what Isaiah 58 suggests we should be about.

According to the latest census data, Orleans Parish is home to around 378,000 people, or about 78% of its pre-Katrina population. There are at least 100,000 who have not yet returned. (NOLA.com: Katrina 9 Years Later)

We say "yet," because there continues to be steady population growth, with the neighborhoods hardest-hit seeing the greatest growth in the past four years. Both the Lower Ninth Ward and New Orleans East have experienced growth exceeding 20% since 2010, but they still have a ways to go as they remain well below their 2005 populations. (The Data Center: Neighborhood Growth Rates)

The levees have been rebuilt and improved, but much work needs to be done in restoring our protective wetlands.

We host an average of over 3,000 volunteers a year from across the country, and in 2015 we anticipate welcoming our 25,000th volunteer to Camp Restore!

In our construction efforts, we're now working almost exclusively with families who've had the toughest time recovering- and for whom funding for materials is scarce. Since 2012, we've completed 55 restoration projects on family homes, with much financial

help for materials coming from our volunteer groups.

Additionally, the Trinity-Claiborne facility in the Lower Ninth Ward was completely restored in 2012, and a permanent commercial kitchen was built at Camp in 2013.



Nearly a third of our volunteers have worked on dozens more homes in partnership with St. Bernard Project, Habitat for Humanity, Rebuilding Together New Orleans, LowerNine.org and other community organizations.

Nearly half of our volunteers have served tens of thousands of hours over a wide range of volunteer opportunities with our nonprofit partners across the Greater New Orleans area.

Behind all the numbers are the relationships built and life-changing results of service with one another. Our NOLA family is growing far beyond Louisiana!

We've got an ever-increasing range of volunteer opportunities to address our long-term issues and develop solutions together. We thank everyone in the Southern District who has partnered with us from the first day until now, and invite you to join us moving forward!

## Concordia College Alabama – Selma, AL

Concordia College Alabama is expanding its degree programs this fall with the addition of two new Bachelor of Science degrees: B.S. Criminal Justice and B.S. Social and Behavioral Sciences. These new degrees are in addition to CCA's B.S. in Education and B.S. in Business Administration.

This is the first time since 1999 that new bachelor's degree programs have been added to the academic program. The new degrees were approved for immediate implementation by the college's accrediting agency, Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges.

Concordia also received approval from SACS COC for the addition of two new concentrations in the Bachelor of Science Business Administration program: Organizational Leadership and Management Information Systems. In addition, the College will offer a new associate's degree in Applied Management.

"When we received approval for the new programs, I was very happy for the faculty and staff because it's a result of their hard work," said Rev. Dr. Tilahun Menedo, Concordia President. "I'm even happier for the students and the community because this is just the beginning of making a bigger impact in service and expanding our academic reach."



The 2014-2015 school year began on August 11, 2014, with many Southern District pastors bringing prayers and presence to the opening service.



**Deadlines:** The Spirit of Southern is produced six times a year. Deadlines are the 15th of odd numbered months (Jan., Mar., May, July, Sept., Nov.) Please keep in mind that from deadline to your mailbox is a time frame of approximately one month. If you wish to announce a coming event, it should be sent well ahead of the event date. Material received after the deadline will be included in the web edition.

**What to send:** We look for the "good news" of events happening in your congregation – special programs, outreach events, installations, dedications, anniversaries, new member Sundays, etc. A good photo is a plus! Please see photo information below. The guideline for article length is 200 words.

**What cannot be used:** Our non-profit postal permit does not allow for any advertisement. Therefore, we cannot include information that may result in sales of a product or service. Also, space does not permit the publication of creative writing.

**How to submit:** The preferred method is e-mail to the editor at [sosstuff@yahoo.com](mailto:sosstuff@yahoo.com). Articles and photos may also be mailed to the District Office (The Spirit of Southern – Southern District LCMS –100 Mission Drive, Slidell, LA 70460-5221). Please allow 2 weeks for mailing.

**Photos:** Please send photos as a JPEG file. Photos included in a Word file are not reliable.

Please keep in mind that we cannot improve the quality of your photo. A dark background or grainy print will look darker or grainier in the publication. If you are using a digital camera, please set to the **highest resolution**. This is necessary for a quality photo to be produced on a press. If you are sending a print, use a high quality photo paper or photo lab printing. Scanned pictures and photocopies cannot be used, and prints are not returned.

**Where:** Outdoor photos will generally result in a better photo for publication. Be sure that indoor pictures are taken in a brightly lit location with a light background, if possible.

**What:** A good question to ask is, "What would I like people to see from this event?" Include people whenever possible. If individuals can be identified, please include that information with the photo.

**Installation photos:** The traditional photo of pastors in attendance at the installation is a wonderful memento for the pastor to keep, but we prefer for publication that you include the pastor and members of his new congregation (officers, call committee, elders, etc.) as they begin ministry together. Another option is the pastor and his family as they are welcomed into a new congregational family.
