## Our Dependence on God

*The devil said to him (Jesus), "If you are the Son of God, command this stone to become bread." (Luke 4:3)*

Lent is a season for self-examination, for purification, for facing the truth about those temptations that we have allowed to prevail in our lives. Temptations come upon us subtly. They sneak up when we are tired and have let our guard down, and they attempt to take something that may be harmless, or even good in itself, and pervert it to the wrong use.

There is nothing evil in a desire for food. To suggest a way to satisfy your hunger when you have been without food for an extended period of time would appear to be helpful. In Luke's Gospel reading for today Jesus had been without food for 40 days. He was hungry and in a weakened physical condition. To a person confined to the logic of this world, his fasting could seem extreme and unreasonable.

Satan, the author of temptations, had stalked Jesus and taunted him

during his fast but had waited for Jesus' weakest moment for a frontal attack. "If you are the Son of God, command this stone to become bread." Obviously Jesus was capable of turning a stone into bread, but that was not the issue. Luke tells us that he was specifically being led by the Spirit. He was under the moment-by-moment direction of his Father. Would he continue to trust his Father even when things seemed so difficult? Satan would be whispering in his ear, "Is this any way to treat a son? Perhaps he doesn't really care for you. Perhaps this is some trick. Maybe there is no good purpose in all this. Maybe you've gone too far in this 'being led by the Spirit' business. Let me suggest a better, more spectacular way."

Are we willing to listen to the Word of God when we are having difficult times, when the circumstances of life seem unfriendly, when our feelings are beginning to hassle us rather than support us? Will we continue to trust God when the "voices" come that harass us and try to convince us that God doesn't really care? For Jesus it wasn't a matter of food, it was a matter of trust. Would Jesus continue to trust his Father or would he take matters into his own hands?

The great temptation for us is to prove that we are strong, that we can handle things, that we can take care of ourselves and meet our own needs. If we are tempted to leave the more difficult path that the Spirit seems to be leading us along at the moment, we may be listening to the wrong person. This is the exact moment for us to continue to trust in the goodness and love of our Heavenly Father and his gift of restoring grace in Jesus.

*Dear Father, during this Lenten season, deepen our trust in your goodness, and maintain that inner assurance that your way is always best, and that even in the most difficult times your grace will be sufficient for all our needs. Through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.*

That thought is what brought the development of the Backpack Weekend Food Program to Escambia County School Department. Low income children are fed at school during the week, but on the weekend sometimes do not have sufficient nutrition.

Several churches in the county pack bags with enough food for the child to have 3 meals a day plus snacks over the weekend. The meals are single serving, kid friendly foods that the child is able to prepare. Grace – Pensacola, FL shops for and packs 30 bags each week for children in K-5th grade. Bags are delivered to the school assigned to our church where the guidance counselor chooses the children and the names are kept confidential. The cost of the program is \$100/child for the 30 weeks of the school year.
